What a great day!

Today we officially began hiking, covering 14 km through a beautiful variety of terrain — mountain pastures, rolling hills, and alpine lakes. Every turn seemed to offer something new.

Our first hike was a resounding success. Despite the higher temperatures, staying well hydrated and the refreshing mountain breezes helped keep us comfortable throughout the day.

Dürrenstein

Today started with a steady 500 m ascent over just 2.5 km. The climb followed a series of switchbacks, and while gradual in sections, the continuous uphill made it a real challenge — comparable to hiking Signal Hill two and a half times.

Thankfully, the weather was on our side, with cooler temperatures around 25°C and a pleasant mountain breeze.

At the top, we were rewarded with a picnic lunch overlooking the Austrian border and the iconic Tre Cime. After taking in the views, we descended to the Dürrenstein hut, where lemonades and apple strudel were the perfect treat to end the day.

Kreuzberg Pass

Today's hike took us over Kreuzberg Pass, one of the historic routes into the Sexten Dolomites.

Another steady 500 m ascent led us through quiet forest trails and along World War I military paths, once used by soldiers moving supplies through the mountains.

Higher up, we passed World War II bunkers — constructed as a precaution in case Germany turned against Italy.

We ended the climb at a small local farm, where we sat in the sun, shared lunch, and took in views that were nothing short of exceptional.



Monte Piana

I'm a day behind on posting — the days are drifting by, and our hikes are becoming fewer as this incredible journey winds down. But today's hike really stayed with us.

We spent the day walking across Monte Piana, a former World War I frontline battlefield. The scenery was breathtaking — wide-open views of the Dolomites, soft light, and endless sky — yet the weight of history was everywhere.

Trenches, tunnels, and the quiet stillness of a place where so many lives were lost created a powerful atmosphere.

It was both beautiful and sobering — a reminder of how stunning this world is, and how fragile.
